## CHN487B Readings of Twentieth-Century Chinese Literature: Short Stories

#### DESCRITPTION

This upper-level undergraduate course introduces modern Chinese literature to advanced learners of Chinese through a variety of short stories from the People's Republic of China, Taiwan, and Hong Kong written throughout the twentieth century. The materials are organized in a roughly chronological order, with emphasis on recurring themes and motifs. Students will gain an understanding of the main issues and broad trends in modern Chinese literature as well as the dynamic relationship between literature and the twentieth-century Chinese experience. This class is conducted in Chinese, and most stories are expected to be read in Chinese while some theoretical readings are to be done in English. Through close reading exercises, students will improve their reading ability of Chinese and expand their academic and professional language repertoire.

Students will be able to

- > read and comprehend texts written in Chinese from modern Chinese literature.
- identify and describe major authors, works, features, forms, and styles of modern Chinese literature.
- Araw critical connections between literary texts and their historical contexts.

conduct independent research on topics in modern Chinese literature, and effectively communicate the results.

Students will

- develop their understanding of the world with emphasis on China by integrating specialized study in modern Chinese literature and understanding Chinese culture and history.

#### Attendance and participation (20%)

Excused absences, such as illness or death in the immediate family, must be documented. Airline reservations and other travel plans do not constitute excused absences.

Absent students are responsible for acquiring relevant class notes and handouts **from fellow students**. Work assigned in a student's absence will not be given a later deadline without prior agreement with the instructor.

Students are expected to read all assigned texts, and come to class with informed thoughts to contribute to class discussion.

Active participation in class is encouraged and required. Listening carefully and working with others in groups are also essential aspects of participation.

# ➢ Weekly Report (30%)

Students are required to write a 1-page weekly report (10 in total) in response to the assigned story on a certain topic given in advance.

#### Presentation (15%)

Students are required to complete 2 presentations (7-10 minutes each) to give an analytical interpretation of a given story. You may choose your preferred time slots and stories to take on. You need not write the weekly report on the stories you choose for the presentation.

# ➢ Group project (15%)

Students are required to participate a group project. Instructions will be given in advance.

# ➢ Final Paper (20%)

A 2000-character essay to be completed at the end of the semester.
