Course description

The course KOR 632 (*Korean Phonology and Morphology*) is designed to provide graduate students with basic notions of phonetics, phonology and morphology, phonological phenomena in Korean, and how Korean phonology and phonetics interact in L2 acquisition. In addition, acoustic analysis, including prosodic analysis with aid of phonetic software, will be carried out.

Course Requirements

1. Readings: Prior to the discussion of a topic in class, relevant reading assignments will be made. All reading assignments are to be completed on schedule.

2. Assignments: Various types of assignments will be regularly given. Please submit 1 or 2 questions (in English) of all reading assignments via *Laulima Class Discussion* by the day before class (Tuesday by 10 PM). Bibliography & Outline of paper/design of project should be submitted by the designated date. Students will be required to assemble a (annotated) bibliography of publications relevant to the study of a segment, a single phonological process or a morphological process of your choice. The bibliography can be used for your term paper and must be formatted in accordance with either the American Psychological Association (APA) style or the Linguistic Society of America (LSA) style **3. Presentations:** Students will be expected to give three oral presentations of readings (one from sound patterns of Korean, one from phonology/phonetics-related articles, and one from word formation in Korean), in addition to a final term paper presentation. The

three (four) presentations will count for 40% of your final grade. See the course schedule below for presentation slots.

4. Term paper: A term paper relevant to one (or more) Korean phonological or morphological phenomenon of your choice; research design, including literature review. (at least 10 double-spaced pages)

Evaluation and grading: The final course grade for KOR 632 will be

determined as followings: Attendance & Participation: 10% Assignments, Bibliography & Outline of paper: 10% Three presentations: 40% Term paper & final presentation: 40%
