### JPN 452 Introduction to Japanese Pedagogical Grammar Fall 2022

The students need to know basic linguistic terms, and to be proficient in Japanese to be able to comprehend and create teaching materials.

### **Course Description**:

This course covers the essential syntactic, semantic and discourse/pragmatic properties of basic Japanese grammatical patterns that are introduced in the beginner's and intermediate level Japanese. This course will be very useful and beneficial for those who are planning to teach (or currently teaching) Japanese at high school or college.
