KOR 399: Korean Flagship I

I. <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>

KOR 399 (1 up to 3 credits) is a mandatory credit/non-credit course for Flagship students and covers cocurricular and extra-curricular activities, including cultural events throughout the semester, in addition to one-on-one tutoring and advising regularly. Specifically, KOR 399 will be a combination of lectures by both instructor(s) and guest speakers, interactive activities, asynchronous (technology-enhanced) vocabulary learning activities, standardized test practices (i.e., TOPIK and OPI), and academic/cultural/professional events. Attendance and participation are critical parts of the course. Students are required to take at least two KOR 399 courses (Fall and Spring semesters).

II. <u>STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES</u>

At the end of the course, the students who complete the course successfully will be able to:

- 1. understand the Korean Flagship program (goals, curriculum, assessment, financial aid planning, and summer program preparation),
- 2. be familiar with Korean standardized tests, including the Test of Proficiency in Korean (TOPIK) and Oral Proficiency Interviews (OPI),
- 3. understand diverse issues related to Korea through guest lectures,
- 4. expand vocabulary through Sino-Korean 4-character idioms and technology-enhanced vocabulary learning activities,
- 5. gain a deeper understanding of Korean culture through various activities, and
- 6. develop Korean speaking strategies through free-talking sessions.

There is no textbook required for this class. Authentic materials for special lectures will be provided by the instructor(s). These will be distributed to you as the semester progresses.

1. Attendance & Participation (40%)

Attendance is a critical component of the course. If you are late or absent, it is YOUR responsibility to contact the instructor to make up for the missed work. Additionally, active class participation will help improve your language proficiency. An absence will be counted as an absence regardless of the reason. It will be excused only upon the instructor's discretion for extenuating circumstances with a verifiable written document on a case-by-case basis. Multiple tardiness and early leaves will add up to an absence. Tardiness or early leaves of more than 20 minutes will be counted as one absence. You may still join the class if you are late; however, please remember that delay can disrupt the class. If you accumulate three (3) or more unexcused absences, you will automatically get a non-credit for the course. You will retake the system in the following academic year (Please note that this policy does NOT translate into automatically passing the course if you have less than two absences.)

2. Three Tutoring/Event Logs (20%)

Students will write a log of their tutoring sessions: Week 4, Week 9, and Week 15. The dates to submit tutoring logs are 9/19 (W4), 10/24 (W9), and 12/5 (W15); the due dates are marked in bold on the course schedule. Try to submit within 24 hours of tutoring sessions. At the latest, they must be submitted by 11:59 pm (HST) on Sunday. Include specific examples rather than specific comments. Due to the time-sensitive nature of the weekly log, <u>50%-point deductions are made on late submissions</u>. If you missed or did not have a tutoring session, you must still submit your tutoring log with the reason for not having a tutoring session. A tutoring link will be sent to your @hawaii.edu email address one week before its due date for tutoring and event log submissions.

3. Vocabulary Learning Project (40%)

Students will expand their vocabulary through various self-paced vocabulary activities (asynchronous study) aided by Technology-Enhanced Language Learning strategies. Ten vocabulary learning sessions

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will be conducted every semester, a 45-minute session to gain competency in spoken Korean. The session will begin right after the KOR 399 class at 4:15 pm. This semester, the students are expected to create a script of a short interview and video-record the interview. A brief tutorial session will be designed to serve as a guide for KOR 399 students to upload and share their productions with instructors. Students will receive feedback and comments from their tutors on their performance.
