Course Description & Objectives

KOR 402 (3 credits) is the second half of the fourth-year Korean course designed for students who have successfully completed KOR 401 or its equivalent. This course covers four language domains (speaking, listening, reading, writing) to develop well-balanced functional proficiency in Korean. Through learner-centered activities in class and various types of assignments, students will have ample opportunities to develop communication skills. A wide variety of interesting authentic materials are integrated in this course to help expand the understanding of Korean culture and society.

Over the course of KOR 402, students will develop language performance at **Intermediate High** or **Advanced Low** level in the three modes of communication: interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational (See the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) proficiency guidelines for this level at:

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

Interpersonal communication (listening and speaking)

- exchange information/ideas in conversations and discussions on the textbook-related topics using connected sentences and asking a variety of questions.
- comprehend and produce learned vocabulary/expressions in appropriate contexts.
- use strategies to maintain communication, such as asking for clarification, rephrasing, restating when not understood, or circumlocution.

Interpretive communication (listening, reading or viewing)

- identify the main ideas and most supporting details in the textbook materials and supplementary audio/video materials.
- develop literacy strategies such as skimming and scanning, recognizing keywords, noting organizational features, guessing meaning from context, identifying logical inferences, identifying the author's perspectives.

Presentational communication (speaking and writing)

- deliver presentations on a concrete topic they have learned/researched using connected sentences and appropriate cohesive devices (e.g., sentence connectors, transitions).
- write a summary about something they have learned.
- write a report that explains/interprets survey results from charts, graphs, or infographics.

* Students taking the course on the CR/NC option must achieve **at least a C (not C-)** overall average to receive credit. Students will need to achieve a minimum overall average of **73** in order to receive a grade of C or CR.

Course Requirements

1. Attendance/Participation (10%)

Attendance is a crucial part to succeed in a language classroom. You are expected to arrive on time and participate actively in all class activities. Attendance will be checked at the very beginning of the class.

The basic rules are as follows:

- 3 tardiness is counted as 1 absence.
- 1 absence will result in 0.5% deduction in attendance/participation grade.
- Being late by 15 minutes OR leaving the class 15 minutes early is considered as an absence.
- It is your responsibility to find out what you have missed during your absence.
- Absences and tardiness are excused only when discussed with the instructor in advance.
- You should speak Korean during class time. Excessive use of English during pair/group work will negatively affect your participation points.

2. Assignments (15%):

Various types of homework (e.g., worksheets, recordings, listening comprehensions, etc.) will be given throughout the semester. Homework assignments are due at the beginning of the next class unless a specific date is notified. Refer to "**Course Schedule**" on Google Classroom to find out your daily homework.

Late assignment policy:

- Late work **within a week** can be accepted, but there will be **5% deduction** per each day delayed, starting from the due date. For example, 5% is deducted for the same day, but late submission, and 10% is deducted for the next day submission.
- The student who submitted the late work should notify the instructor for their late submission. Otherwise, it might not be checked.
- Submitting assignments **during the class time** is **NOT** allowed.
- The late submissions **without** late work point deductions are permitted **ONLY** when the reason is verifiable and discussed with the instructor in advance.

Overall grading policy: Homework assignments (especially writing) are graded by the <u>quality</u> of your work (thoughtful and thorough responses), not just by completion.

3. Media Log (5%):

Over the semester, you will watch or read media (not class materials) on the internet (e.g., Korean dramas, movies, YouTube, webtoons, blogs, news articles/reports, etc.) that you find interesting to you once a week for at least 20-30 minutes. Then, you will record a summary with your thoughts/feelings in Padlet. Each student will listen to one classmate's summary in Padlet and leave a comment.

4. Shadowing Practice (5%):

Starting from the mid-semester, you will do speaking fluency building practice called shadowing for eight weeks. The teacher will provide the shadowing materials (short dialogues). Detailed guidelines will follow.

5. Vocabulary Quizzes (10%):

There are vocabulary quizzes for each lesson. **The lowest vocabulary quiz score will be dropped** at the end of semester. **NO MAKE-UP** quizzes or tests are allowed unless official documentation with the reason is submitted in advance.

6. Lesson Tests (15%):

There will be lesson tests after each lesson is finished. Lesson tests generally cover vocabulary, grammar, reading, listening, and writing.

7. Writing Tasks (10%):

There will be some writing tasks with different genre on the textbook-related topics. Students will have a chance to revise their written work through teacher feedback and a peer review activity.

8. Oral Performances (15%):

Oral performance includes presentation, speaking recordings (homework), and various in-class speaking tasks. The guidelines will be provided.

9. Final Exam (15%):

The final exam contains all the chapters covered over the semester. The study guide and the review session will be provided.

Student Conduct: Academic dishonesty

Cheating, plagiarism, or other forms of academic dishonesty are not permitted within this course and are prohibited within the Systemwide Student Conduct Code (EP 7.208). Examples include: fabrication, facilitation, cheating, plagiarism, and use of improper materials.
