KOR 621(3 Credits): Media Analysis in Korean I

1. Course Description and Objectives:

This course aims to provide the students with the opportunity to further improve their listening, reading, writing, and speaking skills by media research of current events and social issues related to Korea.

Korean proficiency (ACTFL: intermediate high/Advanced low) are expected to take this course. The course will encourage students to expand their Korean literacy and cultural knowledge through diverse readings and research in related topics. Students' active participation and contributions are strongly recommended.

2. Required Reading Materials:

There is no assigned textbook for this class. All material used in this study will be on-line materials available to the public.

3. Learning Outcomes

3.1. Course Learning Outcomes/objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will develop:

- i) the skills to comprehend, analyze and critique reading and listening materials on current Korean issues
- ii) confidence in their comprehension and production abilities
- iii) further knowledge about the Korean culture/system
- iv) listening, reading, writing, and speaking proficiency
- v) grammatical accuracy
- vi) advanced vocabulary

3.2. Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)

Students will learn in this class how to:

1) read and comprehend superior-level Korean materials in various fields of Korean studies;

2) express their opinions & ideas by using professional-level vocabulary and formal/sophisticated expressions;

- 3) develop reading, speaking and writing strategies;
- 4) make oral presentations in Korean only, concerning an assigned or chosen topic or issue; and

5) use a variety of Korean reference works and sources, including dictionaries and encyclopedias both in book form and on the internet.

3.3. Institutional Learning Objectives (ILOs)

The course will be able to help students 1) develop their understanding of the world with emphasis on Korea by integrating Korean language into diverse academic issues such as politics, government, economy, society, visual and performing arts [Know], 2) improve their written communication skills [Do], and 3) demonstrate excellence, integrity, and engagement through respect for people and cultures, in particular, Korean culture [Value].

4.1. Participation (25%)

Participation is important for this class. Students are expected to actively participate in forum discussions as well as synchronous activities in class. Guidelines on forum participation will be provided in class.

Attendance and participation will be taken very seriously in this course. All students are expected to arrive on time, attend class regularly, and participate ACTIVELY in all the class activities.

• Every week students will be asked to;

1) Listen to/watch a 2-3 minute news clip related to the weekly topic: Listening Material (LM), or

- 2) Read a news article related to the weekly topic: Reading Material (RM)
- And post the following at Laulima forum (by Friday Midnight)
- 4) **Response**: Respond to at least **five** opinion piece/discussion topic **before class**.

4.2. Assignments (30%)

Each week students will upload the following two assignments to the Laulima forum.

1) **Opinion pieces**: Write an informal opinion piece about the weekly topic by **Friday Midnight** (on a controversial issue). (at least 10 sentences)

2) Summary of the LM/RM ($5 \sim 10$ sentences)

3) Weekly Discussion topic: Prepare a discussion topic related to the weekly topic to lead a discussion in class and post it on the forum by Friday Midnight

4.3. Presentations (25%)

- Each student will make (up to 2) presentations.
- Students will prepare a 10 to 15-minute presentation presenting on an issue/event related to the weekly topic.
- Students will provide their analysis of the event/issue and lead the discussion.
- The presentation will be evaluated based on whether the student has
- 1) correctly distinguished facts from opinions,
- 2) described facts accurately,

3) identified relevant ethical issues,

- 4) present their opinions clearly, and
- 5) logically support their opinion(s).

4.4. Final paper (20%)

Submit a short opinion piece related to one of '얼'

1. Format: 11 point. 1 inch margin all sides. Font: 맑은고딕 (if using MS word).

Maximum 3 pages.

- Your claim/opinion before week 8
- Outline before week 9
- 2. Final draft due: by the end of the Final test week
- 3. Presentation: Week 13 (PPT)

- i) Clearly state your claim/opinion,
- ii) Provide your reasoning/evidence,

- v) Follow your outline.
